## Communications for personnel of Allied Expeditionary Force

5. No communications may be sent or received by civilians for or on behalf of any member of the Allied Expeditionary Force (military, naval, air force or civilian) except by persons or agencies authorized by Military Government.

## Subjects prohibited

6. No' reference either open or hidden will be made to any of the following subjects unless already officially released as public information by appropriate authority:

a) Information concerning military air or naval operations against countries "at war with the United Nations.

- b) Location, description, strength, identity, movements or prospective movements of forces of the United Nations or any details of their material or equipment.
- c) Location, description, identity, cargoes, movements or prospective movements, ports of arrival or departure, oFffime of arrival or departure of any military, air or naval shipping of the United Nations; or any other shipping information which enemies of the United Nations could use to interfere with commerce of the United Nations or neutral nations.

 d) Data concerning military air, or naval communications or intelligence methods or results.

- e) Information about the residence, quarters or movements of officials or agents of the United Nations, including high-ranking army, air or naval officers, staffs and diplomatic missions.
- f) Disclosure of diplomatic negotiations or conversations.
- g) Names of persons arrested, detained, questioned or interned by the occupying forces; location or description of places of intern-
- ment. ' .
- h) Any information, rumors or propaganda which might directly or indirectly aid persons hostile to the United Nations, impair the interests of the United Nations, hinder the operation of necessary civilian services, disturb relations among the United Nations or generally be contrary to the interest of public order or the safety of occupying troops.
